In the vibrant heart of Kathmandu, Handmade History II unfolded as a dynamic artist residency at UNNATI Cultural Village, held in collaboration with the Raza Foundation. Curated by Manish Pushkale, the program brought together three Indian and two Nepali artists— M. Pravat, Ravi Kashi, Pratul Dash, Bijaya Maharjan, and Rashmi Amatya. It offered a rich space for artistic inquiry, dialogue, and cross-cultural collaboration. Exploring the themes of materiality, memory, and transformation, the artists reflected on what endures and what fades—blurring lines between the tangible and the forgotten. This second chapter deepened regional artistic ties, fostering a shared language through form, matter, and meaning.



Bijaya Maharjan

Bijaya Maharjan, a talented sculptor based in Kathmandu, Nepal, has completed his Master's Degree in Fine Arts (Sculpture) from Tribhuvan University. In 2009 he learnt Hanji – traditional Korean paper making from Jang Yong Hoon and Seong Woo at Jang Ji Bang, Korea, with funding from INKO Centre, Chennai.
